

DR. W.P. OLIVER, DEACON GEORGE WILLIAMS, SISTER RUTH JOHNSON

The Testimonial Dinner held at Keddy's Motor Inn in honor of three prominent leaders of the Cobequid Road Baptist Church, Mrs. Ruth Johnson, Dr. W.P. Oliver and Deacon George Williams. most prestigious dinner was well represented by all the churches of the African Baptist Association. Deacon Gary Lopes of the Cobequid Road Baptist Church was the Master of Ceremonies for this honorable The dignitaries of the various Black Communities that spoke in recognition of the three honaries were: Deacon Churchill Smith of the Victoria Road Baptist Church and Moderator of the African Baptist Association; Rev. Donald Skeir, A.U.B.A. Clerk and teacher; Dr. J.C. Mack pastor of the Cornwallis St. Baptist Church; 'Deacon S.M. Jones of the Cornwallis St. Baptist church; Rev. D.E. Fairfax of the Victoria Road Baptist Church; Rev. Calvin Symonds of the Zion Baptist Church in Truro; Rev. W. Bryant, Minister at large of the Baptist Convention; Deacon Aubrey Whiley of the Emmanuel Baptist Church in Hammonds Plains; Frank Boyd, Director of the Black Cultural Society; Angela Carvery & Debra Williams sang spiritual favorites which pleased all; Deacon Bruce Williams, Earnie Williams, Stan Carvery and Doug Williams rendered musical numbers; Mrs. Gwendolyn Best formerly of Sydney; Mrs. Williams of Boston, Mass. and husband. Guest speaker of the evening Deacon Harold Williams of Boston, U.S.A.

This highly recognized dinner in honor of our most prominent three black leaders, who dedicated their lifes to God, family, church, community and various communities throughout Nova Scotia are well known throughout Canada. DR. WILLIAM PEARLY OLIVER, B.A., M. Div., D.C.L.

William Pearly Oliver was born in Wolfville, Kings County, Nova Scotia, February 11, 1912. He is the grandson of William Oliver who served as caretaker of the Ladies Seminary and later College Hall at Acadia University, 1880 to 1934. He is the son of Clifford Oliver, Wolfville, and Dorothy Moore, Halifax. Dr. Oliver was educated in the Wolfville Public schools and graduated from Wolfville High School in 1930. He attended Acadia University where he received his B.A. in 1934 and his B.D. (M. Div.) in 1936. Throughout his high school and university career he participate in football, basketball, hockey, track and field, water polo and long distance running. In 1927 he set a record for the 7 Mile Road Race — (Kentville to Wolfville) which, to this date, stands unbroken. In 1964 the University of Kings College, Halifax, honoured him with the degree of Doctor of Civil Law.

Dr. Oliver is married to the former Althea Pearleen Borden of New

Glasgow. They have five sons:

MINISTRY

Dr. Oliver was baptized in 1926 by Dr. A. N. Marshall and became a member of the Wolfville Baptist Church. He was licenced to preach by the Wolfville Baptist Church in 1936 upon graduating with his B. D (M. Div.) in 1936. He was ordained in the Baptist Ministry in August, 1936 at the Windsor Plains United Paptist Church where he served as pastor for one year. He then received a call to the Cornwallis Street Baptist Church in Halifax. He served this church and community from 1937 to 1962. At the same time he also held services at the Cobequid Road United Baptist Church and the Beechville United Baptist Church. In 1962 he resigned from the Cornwallis Street Baptist Church to assume full-time responsibilities with the Nova Scotia Department fo Education, Adult education program with whom he had been working casually since 1946. Although employed full-time, he continued on as pastor at the Cobequid Road United Baptist Church and the Beechville United Baptist Church, a position he holds at the present time.

He has served on all major committees of the Atlantic Baptist Convenction and in 1960 was elected president on the first ballot.

Dr. Oliver served as the treasurer of the African United Baptist Association for 11 years and as clerk of the Association for 18 years. While serving in these positions the following organizations were initiated: The Baptist Youth Fellowship of the African United Baptist Association of Nova Scotia, the Laymen's Council of the African United Baptist Association of Nova Scotia, and the Rural and Urban Life Committee.

He was an active organizer of the Nova Scotia Association for the Advancement of Coloured People, which was incorporated in 1945. His work with the NSAACP resulted in a Carnegie Travel Bursary in 1949, enabling him to study educational programs in the United States. Returning to Nova Scotia he became a part time staff member with the Adult Education Division of the Nova Scotia Department of Education as an advisor on educational programs in Black Communities.

WAR SERVICE

Dr. Oliver served as Chaplain to Black personnel during the Second World War. He had the rank of Captain. During this period and immediately following, he was active with the Canadian Legion and was made an honorary life member.

NOVA SCOTIA DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

1946-1962 During this period, Dr. Oliver was employed casually and then part-time with the Department of Education, Adult Education Program. He was an advisor on programs in Black Communities of Nova Scotia. During this time programs of Continuing Education and Community Development were initiated.

1962-1977 Dr. Oliver was employed as full-time Regional Representative of Continuing Education for the Halifax-Dartmouth and Halifax County. He retired from this position February 28, 1977. Dr. Oliver was instrumental in the organization and initiating of many community services such as Adult Education Evening Classes, organization of community schools in Halifax County, Small Business Management Training in the Province of Nova Scotia, and as Secretary to the Education Fund for Black Students.

Dr. Colin Thomson, Department of History at the University of Lethbridge, Alberta received his doctorate upon completion of his thesis - W. P. Oliver, Black Educator.

Dr. Oliver has written many articles and lectures on the history, economic and sociological problems of Blacks in Nova Scotia.

LECTURERS, SPEECHES AND ARTICLES

Hundreds of speeches to Service Clubs, University groups, Church groups, School groups, and the Nova Scotia Summer School, have been written and delivered on this subjects of Human Rights, Race Relations, Continuing Education, and Community Development. Many articles on the Black people of Nova Scotia and their efforts to deal with their problems, have appeared in a number of National magazines.



DEACON GEORGE ALBERT WILLIAMS

Deacon George Albert Williams was born May 19, 1911, the son of the late Deacon Charles Henry Williams and the late Dorothy Williams. He came from a family of 15 and was raised and educated in Lower Sackville.

As a young boy he attended Sunday School and Church at Cobequid Road United Baptist Church and joined the Church in 1936 at the age of 27. In August, 1939, he was ordained Deacon and in August, 1983, will be celebrating his 44th Anniversary as an ordained Deacon.

In 1931 he married Annie Sims, who died in 1950.

On June 12, 1954, he married the former Estella Marguerite Martin of Barrensfield, Cumberland County, Nova Scotia. Following their marriage the resided in Amherst, Nova Scotia and in 1959 they returned to Cobequid Road. On June 12, 1983, Deacon George and Mrs. Williams celebrated their 29th Wedding Anniversary.

Upon return to Cobequid Road, Deacon George promptly returned to his activities in the church. Deacon George has been actively involved in the Cobequid Road Church for 47 years and has held almost every office in the Church. It is interesting to note that Deacon George has been the Church Treasurer for 22 years, retiring from this position in January, 1983

Deacon George served as Sunday School Teacher and Superintendant of Sunday Schools for several years and was also active in the Men's Brotherhood where he served as President. He is still an active member of the Brotherhood and is at present our Senio, Adviser.

d) While active in the Scout Movement, received the Scouter's 25 year medal, in recognition of services rendered as a Scoutmaster and leader in the movement.

e) Served for 25 years as Pastor of the Cornwallis St. Baptist Church in Halifax. Resigned in 1962 to enter full time service with the N.S. Dept. of Education, Continuing Education Program. Continued serving the churches of Beechville and Cobequid Road, and currently entering the 43rd year with these congregations.

f) Over and above many Honorary Memberships and Awards from Church and Community, King's University, in 1964, conferred the degree of D.C.L., and Acadia University conferred, in 1977, the

degree of D.C.L.

g) Honorary President: Society for Protection and Preservation of Black Culture in Nova Scotia. It was Dr. Oliver's idea and he drew up the original plan in 1972 (11 years ago) for such a Society.

Deacon George has had a variety of experience in the Construction field. He was employed by Archibalds Coal Company during the War years; Brookfield Construction Ltd.: Standard Woodworkers; C. W. Stone; Union Oil Co.; Shell Oil Ltd. and the Department of Education.

During his years with the oil companies he serviced the Halifax-Bedford-Sackville area and made many friends in these areas. While working in the construction trade Deacon George worked on several well known buildings and complexes. namely:

While working for the Department of Education he served as janitor in Caudle Park Elementary School.

Although officially retired in June, 1976, the congregation of Cobequid Road called upon Deacon George to supervise the construction of the addition to the Church and the remodelling of the Church kitchen. This task was very fitting due to the fact that Deacon George also supervised the construction of the Church in 1948.

MRS. RUTH EVELYN JOHNSON

Mrs. Ruth Evelyn Johnson was born in Africville on September 17, 1919 the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William (nee Edith MacDonald) Brown. She came from a family of 4 and received her education in Africville and Richmond schools. Mrs. Johnson also took 4 years of voice training at the Halifax Conservatory of Music and, at the same time, she studied piano from her sister, Jessica, who was also a student at the Conservatory. Later Mrs. Johnson went to Alexandra MacKay Evening School for a course in Bookkeeping. Mrs. Johnson's education did not stop here as she continued taking courses over the years. In 1972 Mrs. Johnson attended the Maritime School of Social Work under the auspices of the Department of Education, Continuing Education, Adult Division and received her Certificate for Indigenous Community Worker.

In 1946 Mrs. Johnson was married by Dr. W. P. Oliver to Gerald J. Johnson and in 1948 moved to Cobequid Road and joined the Cobequid Road United Baptist Church by letter from Seaview Baptist Church. Her knowledge of Christian Service did not start here as in 1929 at the age of 10 she was Baptised by Dr. W. A. White at Seaview Baptist Church.

From 1948 through 1964 Mrs. Johnson held many positions in the Church, including: Church Janitor (1948-1960); Sunday School Teacher and Superintendent; President of the Ladies Auxiliary; Trustee; Treasurer; Organist and Choir Director; and delegate to District Meetings and Associations. Mrs. Johnson was the first woman to become Chairman of District #2 and also made the first set of Choir gowns for Cobequid Road.

Mrs. Johnson served in many offices at the Union United Church of Canada, Montreal, from 1964-1969, which included: Board of Sessions, Board of Stewards, Supervisor of Girl Guides and Brownies, President of the Choir and House Committee.

Upon returning to Cobequid Road, Mrs. Johnson resumed her activities in the Church, Association and Community. She has been a member of the Loyal Wilberforce 7336 I.O.O.F., since 1963. Mrs. Johnson becomes actively involved in any organization she belongs to which is shown in the fact that she has been Secretary of the Wilberforce Lodge for over 10 years and has been Noble Grand and Past Noble Grand.

Mrs. Johnson has been a member of the IODE since 1975 and held the office of Treasurer (1977-1983) and is now Chairman of the Membership Committee. She is also a member of the Committee for making Cancer Dressings. Mrs. Johnson has also been a Volunteer Worker for the Canadian Association for Mentally Retarded and Chairman of the Seed of Hope Campaign.

Mrs. Johnson is actively involved in the African United Baptist Association of Nova Scotia (A.U.B.A.) and is currently Provincial Supervisor of Youth and a former Chairman of Sunday Schools (1975-1976). Mrs. Johnson has been on the Executive of the Women's Institute for 8 years serving as Secretary, President and Past President.

Mrs. Johnson was appointed Indigenous Community Worker by the Department of Education and served in this capacity from 1974 to 1981. She is also a member of the Board of Directors for the Black Cultural Society and a former Councillor of the Black United Front.

Mrs. Johnson's outstanding Volunteer service was noted this year when she was nominated for the Annual Recognition Awards at a Dinner, sponsored by the Y.W.C.A. Mrs. Johnson's activities are not solely restricted to the Bedford-Sackville area. She is often seen aiding organizations in other communities, but no matter which group she is with, Mrs. Johnson is proud of the fact that she is a resident of Cobequid Road.

Mrs. Johnson is classed by some as the "Mother" of the Cobequid Road Church. Her Christian life has been an inspiration to all that know her. Mrs. Johnson has shown the people of Cobequid Road that through Faith in our Saviour, Dedication and Hard Labour, we can achieve things thought impossible.


