CULTURAL NEWS

BLACK CULTURAL CENTRE OPENS:

The Black Cultural Centre of Nova Scotia was officially opened on Saturday September 12, 1983. It's been a long and at times bitter uphill battle since 1977 for the organizers of the Black Cultural Centre, making their opening week even sweeter. This week has been set aside with special events to show quality and richness of Black heritage at the newly constructed museum, library and theatre complex and to officially announce its opening.

Unique in Canada, the centre highlights the history of Blacks in Canada and particularly in Nova Scotia.

Presiding over the opening ceremonies was Mr. Gus Wedderburn, President of Society, who was quoted as saying "the centre is a credit to our government, our people, and ourselves". Past president Dr. W.P. Oliver said that the "occasion represented the greatest day Black people have ever known in the history of Nova Scotia".

Last weekend Premier John Buchanan, International Trade Minister Gerald Regan, and Dr. W.P. Oliver were inducted into the African Friendly Society.

Founded in the 1830's, the African Friendly Society's purpose was to welcome to Nova Scotia runaway slaves and to assist with their settlement in the province. Until succeeded by the African Non-Church institution, which brought the black people of Nova Scotia together.

The Cultural Centre is designed to promote and raise awareness of the diversity and richness of Black culture in Nova Scotia.

The two story centre will house a variety of permanent, semi-permanent and temporary exhibits, a library and reference area, audio-visual room, archives, a workshop and classroom area to teach children creative and industrial arts, a central multi-purpose room to be used for lectures, theatre, concerts, and group assembly-type activities.

The centre was funded through a \$500,000 Federal grant, a \$30,000 Provincial grant and \$100,000 grants from the County of Halifax, the City of Halifax and the City of Dartmouth. The province has also provided an extra \$100,000 grant to cover operating costs.

On Saturday, Premier John Buchanan presented a cheque for \$20,000, International Trade Minister Gerald Regan gave a \$18,240 Federal contribution.

Among the dignitaries present were N.S. Development Minister Rollie Thornhill, Municipal Affairs Minister Tom McInnis, Opposition leader Sandy Cameron and Cole Harbour MLA David Nantes.

Rev. Dr. W.P. Oliver said also it was a 'distinct honour to become part of a society which had done so much for it's people and community. It is providential I receive this honor her in this centre, this is a symbol of the progress and growth of our people and the fulfillment of the promise and goals of those past members. It is a reminder of the courage, faith and determination of our people". Dr. W.P. Oliver, one of the centres' founding fathers and a long time stalwart in the Black community.

The Cultural Centre will ensure our culture will be retained and our youths will always know the importance of their heritage in Nova Scotia. It is a heritage we all will be able to cherish and benefit from.

EASTERN CANADIAN CHAMPION

Carlsberg lights International "B" Ladies Fastball team has won the Eastern Canadian Ladies Intermediate "B" Fastball Championship over the weekend in Woodstock N.B.

This is what you would call a Cinderella happening. All year the ladies won about 3/5 ball games in their league. As far as it's known this was due to lack of coaching more so than lack of playing ability. With about a month left in the girls season, with no play-off hope in their league, they only had one thing to look forward to and they were the provincial champions and the Eastern Canadians.

With about 10 yrs under his belt and a 20 lbs of extra weight, Martin DeLeon, star player and the heart to the well known Beechville Rockets, took over the job of coaching the girls. He knew what the problems were on this team because he was getting first hand information from a close friend on the team, Kathi Beazley. Another edge coach Cleat's had, was he coached the nucleus of this team for the past 3 years and the rest of the team he had seen play so he knew what changes he had to make to be a winner.

It all started on August 19-21 in Antigonish. Since these girls were the only Intermediate "B" team in the central area, they get to represent the area in the provincial. These girls played 6 games that weekend. Their scores were 4-1 over Riverdale Blues Cape Breton 14-1 over Antigonish, 8-1 to River Hebert. Semi-finals 11-1 over Antigonish. Final 8-2 over River Hebert 7-1 over River Herbert. Congratulations Girls!

During the Labour Day Weekend, the girls went to Amherst to play in a tournament to get ready for the Eastern Canadians. They were guaranteed 10 games in two days. That's incredible ball playing. Then in the semi-finals they beat B&B Sluggers 10-0 to advance to the finals against the Red Wings. This game was also a land slide win. Final score 9-2 for Carlsberg. Way to go girls!

Now to make it an official triple crown for the girls, they went to Woodstock, New Brunswick to play in a 4 team Round Robin Tournament. In their first game they thumped P.E.I. 12 - 2. In game two they weren't so impressive as they feel to Sackville, N.B. 7-4, which didn't hurt because of the good game it was. The girls came right back in their third game and whipped host team Woodstock, N.B. 10-0 to advance to the semi-finals.

Not knowing, they made it to the semi-finals just to play Woodstock again. This game, Carlsberg's girls out did Woodstock and came out with a 9-4 win to advance to the finals.

In the finals, they met up with the only team that beat them and that was Sackville, N.B. In order for Carlsberg to win they had to beat Sackville twice because they were undefeated. Well, coach Cleats said to the girls, "We made it this far on our ability, I can't see why we can't go all the way. Woodstock is long way to travel to go back home with silver". The girls put this under the hats and went out

and knocked off N.B. in two games, 6-2 and 5-0.

Colonel Stephen Bluck

Colonel Stephen Bluck was a leading member of the Black Pioneers, a Black corps that fought under the British during the American War of Independence.

He was among the group of former slaves who sailed from New York to Nova Scotia in 1783. Col. Bluck settled at Shelburne and was a school master and spokesman for the Black loyalists.

In 1788, at his home on the Birchtown Road in Shelburne, Col. Bluck entertained Prince William Henry, later to become King William IV. *ON COVER*
