
community for many years. Maybe become undivided and unite as one, working as one force, for the same goals, pushing in the same direction, two positive forces.







BEECHVILLE HISTORY

Below is an official written document to license the land to the men of color (Blacks), the 27th of March 1818, called Beechville at the time. Refugee Hill was also license granted to the Blacks located near the North West Arm in 1815.

License To Men of Colour at Refugee Hill, 27, March 1818 (vol 419, doc. 36:

By His Excellency Lieutenant General Right Honorable George Earl of Dalhousie Baron Dalhousie of Dalhousie Castle Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honorable Military Order of the both Lieutenant Governor and Commander- in- Chief in and over his Majesty's Province of Nova Scotia and dependencies-

License is hereby given to the following men of colour to occupy possess and enjoy for and during the term of five years from the date hereof (then if their conduct is industrious peaceable and loyal subjects shall be approved to receive Granats of confirmations from Government) the following lots of land on which they are respectively settled, situated lying and being in the Township of Halifax to the Westward of the Peninsula of Halifax and within the limist of a tract of land formely granted Martin Shier and others in the following shares or proportions to wit, Unto Abraham Barnes, the Lot Numeber One in the division letter A containing ten Acres, unto Williams Roberts the Lot Number two in said division containing ten Acares, Unto Joseph Blackwell the Lot Number Three containing ten Acres, Unto Abraham Greer the Lot Number Four in said division containing Ten Acres, Unto David Chain the Lot Number Five containing Ten Acres and unto Pompey Cooper the Lot Number One in the division Letter B containing Ten Acres, unto Benjamin Roberts the Lot Number Two in said division Letter B containing Ten Acres, unto Robert Hamilton the Lot Number Five in the said division Letter B containing Ten Acres, unto Henderick Hamilton the Lot Number Six in said division Letter B containing Ten Acres, unto Arron Wheten the Lot Number Seven in said division Letter B containing Ten Acres, unto Charles Lovet Senr., the Lot Number Eight in said division Letter B containing Ten Acres, and unto Charles Lovet Jr., the Lot Number Nine in said division Letter B containing Ten Acres, all which several lots of land are abutted and bounded according to this plan

Given under my Hand and Seal at Arms at Halifax, the 27th day of March 1818 in the 58th year of His Majesty's Reign.



The land was granted for a term of five years if their conduct as industrious, peaceable and loyal subjects was approved, they were supposed to receive grants of confirmation from the Government. The ten men granted land first in Beech Hill and their families consisted of 89 people, they were orginally refugees from the war of 1812. This is a map of Beech Hill during the year of 1816. It shows the ten acre lots the government gave to the first people of the community.

MICHAEL JACKSON

Michael Jackson was born in August of '58. He was the seventh of nine children. His father, Joe Jackson, was a crane operator in Gary, Indiana. Mr. Jackson wanted a much better furture for his family. He wanted his kids to learn to play instruments and to sing. This is when he bought his five oldest sons used guitars and drums and encouraged them to sing.

At the age of four, Michael began singing lead in their little gathering in which they formed a quintet. At first, Mr. Jackson had to show Michael how to hold a microphone. Michael learned quickly.

Their father rehearsed them each day. While the other kids were out playing baseball in the park behind the Jackson house, the Jackson boys were inside sweating and practicing. They were often teased by the other kids who would sometimes make faces in the window.

The Jackson Five started officially in '65. During this year, they entered some Gary talent shows. Winning each contest they entered, Michael remembered being so nervous! He soon mastered the piano and drums. Their first job was at a local place called Lucky's where they earned five dollars a night. Soon they were playing gigs in nearby towns. On the weekends their father would load up the old bus he owned. The Jackson Five performed up to five shows a night. Their pay was usually low.


When their reputation grew as a hot soul act they were later offered a contract with Steeltown Records. They cut two singles for this small Indiana label. These two cuts both failed outside the Gary area. They are now collector's items today.

Legend has it that Diana Ross "discovered" the Jackson Five. That simply isn't true because they always believed that their dad 'discovered' them. It just so happened that they were playing at Theater in Chicago. It was like an audition place for Motown. Diana Ross did introduce them for the stage. But they were already a professional act for years. Motown Records contacted the Jackson Five. Scon after that the group was auditioning at Motown's Detroit office. The boys were accepted at once. Since the boys were still minors, their father had to sign the record contract.

In 1969, the Jackson Five's career took off. "I Want You Back" was a number one Motown hit and this helped their career. Within nine days one million singles were sold. Hit songs were nonstop after that. The Jackson Five cut eleven top 5 singles within 3 years. They then became Motown's biggest sellers ever with Michael as lead singer. Michael started to sing on his own in '71. He made four top 10 hits in two years. One of the records "Ben" reached number one. The Jackson Five's Motwon hits slowed down after awhile. Then the Quintet signed with Epic Records in '76, in this switch over of labels they then became the Jacksons. In '76 "Enjoy Yourself" became a success. Then three years later "Shake Your Body Down (to the ground)". Michael then again sang lead on those Epic winners. In '78, Michael was offered his first movie role in the film "The Wiz" in which he played the scarecrow with Diana Ross, who played Dorothy. After seeing the broadway play seven times he then studied L. Frank Baum's classic "The Wizard of Oz". Michael explains, "The scarecrow is a shy person who didn't believe in himself and he looks for something that he already has". Michael liked filming the movie. He had wanted to act for years. But movie-making isn't all glamour. It took three hours to apply the make-up to Michael's face each day. After peeling the make-up off his face his tired eyes would water.

In '79, The Wiz was a well received film. He hit big again with his "Off The Wall" album. During that year radio airwaves were filled with the sounds of Michael's first Epic hit. That was, "Don't Stop 'Till You Get Enough." This single reached number one in just a matter of time. This hit song also pushed Off The Wall up the charts. Michael won a Granmy award off of his single "Don't Stop 'Till You Get Enough" in which he had co-written. Soon after this "Fock With You", another Off The Wall single followed. By early '80, the LP's title track had become a Third Top ten hit single. "She's Out Of My Life" became the album's fourth hit. The album with all of these famous hits sold an incredible 4 million copies.

Michael explained, "that he's just a person who does different jobs than others. I've never felt I was better than anyone else." Michael now lives in southern California splendor. He lives in a beautiful home and drives new cars. He owns motorcycles and dune buggies. He dresses in the finest clothes, he has been a wealthy success most of his young years.



"Somehow, I had expected something a little different."
