Beechville History

On the following page is the official written document of The Nova Scotia Power Commission, May 9th, 1935. Authorizing the power lines through the Beechville and Timberlea area.

Matthew de Costa

Matthew de Costa was probably the first Black man to come to Canada. He acted as an interpreter for the French among the Micmac Indians in what is now known as Nova Scotia.

He was with the de Monts expedition that founded Port Royal in 1605. As a former slave of Portuguese, it is believed that he learned the Micmac language while serving the Portuguese fishing fleet that had fished in this area for decades before 1605.

Dea r. Cox:

offi ally that the Commission has acted favorably upon the port on a proposed line to supply electric energy along the St. Margaret Bay Road to the districts known as Becchville, Timberlea and Bowser, and involving all that territory lying along the St. Margaret Bay Road between Prospect Road and the property owned by Mr. Aubrey Frager, a distance of approximately six miles.

The Commission, as you may know, operates on a "cost" basis only, that is, profits are entirely eliminated, electric energy being supplied to the consumer at the cost of its production and delivery. As a consequence, the rates that each signed contract bears are based upon the actual number of signatures obtained. It is highly desirable, and important, therefore, that every one of the signatories realizes the responsibility he, or she, has undertaken by signing a contract of this nature. So far as the Commission is concerned, it has met all its obligations to the letter and, in return, earnestly hopes that all those who signed cards during the canvass, or at subsequent dates, will co-operate to the full by having their properties wired in time to take full advantage of the service which will be made available to them very shortly.

On receipt of this letter would you please be good enough to inform all those concerned that they may now proceed with the wiring up of their houses,

etc. at their earliest convenience. To assist you in this matter we are appending a list of the names of all interested parties.

Finally, we would like to thank you for the excellent spirit of co-operation you have shown and which has done so much towards bringing this project to a successful conclusion.

Answers from last week-

Harriet Tubman and Richard Preston



Is there a hole in the wall where you took down the picture? Don't despair — repair. Mix equal amounts of salt and starch with just enough water to make a plaster-like paste. Holes will be covered and no one will know your salt secret.

Remove the bottom screws of towel rack brackets and replace them with cup hooks. See icops on small towels and washclottis; nang them from the hooks.

For convenience when cooking and baking, glue a cork to the top of a recipe file box out a slit in it and insert the recipe card in the slit when in use.

When bathtubs and other enamelled equipment turn yellow, rub with a sponge dipped in a solution of salt and turpentine to bring back their sparkling whiteness.

For keeping an eye on children in a crowded swimming pool, paint the children's names in bright nail polish on the top of their bathing caps.

Keep a "tear" bottle. When a chilo cries, rush for the bottle to catch the tears. Soon he will be running for the bottle himself, and in the excitement of the game the tears will be forgotten.

To prevent container openings from sticking, particularly on nail-polish bottles, tubes of glue, cans of varnish, nonaerosol hair spray, etc., rub petrol-cum jelly inside the cover, and on the grooves before using for the first time.

After washing slipcovers, ease the dreaded job of tugging and pulling them back onto the furniture by wearing a pair of leather gloves. The job will be less aggravating and fingernails will remain unbroken.

Quick hairset-set hair dry. Soak towel in hot water, wring it out, then place around head for 5 minutes to set curls. Econove towel and comb hair when day.

BLACK INFORMATION SERIES NO. 3

HISTORY

 The first European nation to practice the enslavement of blacks from Africa was Portugal.

 Spain was the first country to introduce black slaves in the New World. In 1517 Spanish Bishop Bartolome de la Casas allowed

Spaniards in the New World to import twelve slaves each.

The first African slaves arrived in North America (U.S.) in 1619 to

Jamestown, Virgina. This marked the beginning of one of the most

disreputable chapters in the history of man: The enslavement of

African blacks by white Europeans.

(In a way blacks were not the first people to be enslaved by white settlers in North America, large scale attempts were made to enslave North American Indians. This however proved untenable because of Indian's hostility to enslavement and their susceptibility to European diseases. Attempts were also made to enslave poorer white settlers through a less absolute system of long term indentureship in which someone would sign over their services to a master for a fixed time period in exchange for upkeep. This practice was also used on blacks and often left the indentured person at the mercy of his/her master's cruelty.)

CULTURE & ACHIEVEMENTS

Blacks In Medicine

1. Dr. Daniel Hale Williams (1858 - 1931 U.S.)

First man to successfully perform an open-heart operation (1893).

Founded Provident, Chicago's first black hospital. First black to be elected a fellow of the American College of Surgeons.

Dr. Charles Drew (1904 - 1950 U.S.)

Pioneer in the development of blood blanks. Discovered how to preserve blood plasma, a discovery which was instrumental in saving thousands of lives during World War II. Director of the American Blood Donor Project in World War II.

3. Dr. William A. Hinton (1883 - 1959 U.S.)

Developed the Hinton and Davies-Hinton tests for the detection of Syphillis (a standard test for this disease). First Black Professor at Harvard Medical School.

4. Dr. Theodore Lawless (1894 - * U.S.)

Distinguished dermaloligist one of the world's leading skin specialists. Contributed to the scientific treatment of leprosy and syphillis. Harmon Award (1929) for achievement in medicine.

CANADA & NOVA SCOTIA

The following black Nova Scotians have been invested with The Order Of Canada - our country's highest civilian award.

Isaac Phils - 1967

(Born West Indies grew up in Sydney, N.S., now lives In Dartmouth) World War II Veteran, outstanding community worker in the black community at Whitney Pier, Sydney.

2. Dr. Carrie Best

(Born Tracadie, Guysborough County, now lives in New Glasgow). Women's and Human Rights Activist, author, minority group leader, editor of Nova Scotia's first black newspaper the Clarion 1946-1956. -(later Negro Citizen).

3. Rev. J. C. Mack

(Born in U.S.) Pastor Cornwallis St. Baptist Church outstanding social leader.
