The final process after cloth is woven is to make it shrink. For this, milling frolics are still held occasionally although the custom is kept up now mainly to interest tourists. At this particular milling frolic a long table was set in the middle of the room with six men on one side facing six women. The cloth, supposed to be wet, was passed around the table and beaten there to the strongly marked rhythm of the music. Like a sea chanty, one person takes the verses and joins in the chorus. When they are singing together with the cloth, they hold hands with arms bent at the elbow and fingers at shoulder height.

The later songs on this tape are better than at the beginning. For other milling songs recorded this summer in Cape Breton see Reel 124. There are also French milling songs here.
