78A. I'll Give My Lov e An Apple.

August 28, 1943.

At the singer's home at Chezzetcook, Nova Scotia.

English folk-song.

singer; Dennis Smith, Chezzetcook; aged 92; retired sea captain.

I'll give my love an apple without e'er a core,  
I'll give my love an <sup>dwellin'</sup> apple without e'er a door.

This is the complete song, and the one to be put on the duplicate. Curiously enough he had sung the first part many times to me, but on this day he announced that he knew three more verses. After singing them he rather apologized and said he had known them all the time, but he wasn't quite sure that it was all right to sing me the part about the baby! The last three verses have only three lines each. Apparently he has forgotten the riddle about the thimble. Mr. Smith learned the song from his uncle.

This is one of the most delightful of all folk-songs.

78B. The Dreadful Ghost.

At the singer's home, Chezzetcook, Nova Scotia.

English folk-song.

Singer; Dennis Smith, Chezzetcook; aged 92; retired sea captain.

It's of a sailor of whom I write  
And to the seas he took great delight.

This is very like The Ship's Carpenter although I believe it is a different song. It has a lovely aeolian modal tune. Mr. Smith made a mistake and had to sing the first verse at the end instead of the beginning. Can this be rectified in making the duplicate, or is it better to leave it as it is with his comments?

Mount A re-recording tape No. 8, scratchy and not too well remembered. For better words see TSNs p. 153 & add vs. 2 & 5 from Tom Young's version p. 151. He was probably tired when he made this record.



79A. The Government Store.

August 28, 1943.

At the home of Mr. Dennis Smith, Chezzetcook, Nova Scotia.

Local song.

Singer; Mr. Edward Smith; aged about 50; farmer.

I will have to get the words from the duplicate. Mr. Smith says the song was made up by a man from Cape Breton in the lumber woods.
