Letter from Wentworth to Haimes, explaining why his leave of absence was delayed, and discussing the probability of Haimes being prevented from succeeding Mr. Newton in the office of Collector at Halifax, by the latter's recovery. He hopes Haimes will find a few "pleasing" families to shorten the winter in Shelburne. He thanks him for his communication regarding the Lt.-Governor's proposed successor in Nova Scotia, and says that according to the latest word he has been expected for some time at St. Vincent's to succeed to the government there. The weather has been mild. He sends his best wishes to his old friend General Cuyler and conveys the season's greetings from his household to that of Haimes. (Copy). Vol. 53 pp. 312, 313.

5 Jan Halifax Lt.-Governor (Wentworth) to Sec'y of State (Hobart). Dr. Croke, Judge of the Court of Vice-admiralty, has been duly qualified and entered upon the duties of his office and is desirous to have his rank and precedence established, for which Wentworth asks instructions.

6 Jan Halifax

(Copy). Vol. 53 pp. 313, 314. Copy of despatch from the Lt.-Governor (Wentworth) to the Secretary of State (Hobart), transmitting list of acts passed in the recent legislative session, with explanations and comments on them and on the general state of the province. Eighteen acts. No. 4 gives more adequate provision for the apprehending and punishing of deserters from the army and navy. No. 5, for repairing the streets of Halifax, was made necessary by "the continued increase of the Inhabitants, Buildings and Businesses in the Metropolis". No. 6, for the better management and relief of the poor, has been needed for some time. Numbers 7 to 18 are temporary Acts. No. 14, for the security of navigation, has been passed with a suspending clause until the King's pleasure be known. Comments on sums included in the appropriation bill. The large road grants and the special settlers' grant encourage emigrants to come to Nova Scotia and help in opening up the province. The settlers' grant "has enabled the Commissioners to afford relief and comfort to the late Emigration from Scotland to the Eastern district of this Province. Those people are happily restored to health, and now carefully settled and profitably

employed throughout the Country". Two hundred pounds have been granted to encourage the cultivation of hemp, part of which has been appropriated in purchasing hemp seed from Russia which is to be distributed throughout the province. "The measure of preparing a public Bank in Nova Scotia was under consideration of the Legislature; and upwards of Fifty thousand pounds subscribed, in expectation that the general and important advantages of retaining specie in the Province (more especially, at a time when the demands for silver in the United States daily increased with their traffic to the East Indies) would have met the wishes of the House of Assembly—however, many, particularly from interior parts of the Country, probably unacquainted with the aid and support that such an Institution would afford to commerce and industry—and not aware of the general distress and discouragement to be apprehended from a deficiency of circulating Specie—wished for time to deliberate and to procure information on the subject, by deferring the consideration to another session. Those who were satisfied in their own experience, being opposed to the delay some animated debate in the lower House ensued, which terminated in a hasty resolve of Instructions to the Agent....to interpose in case the Establishment of a Bank should be solicited without the concurrence of the Legislature." In the event of the subject coming up again he will assent to it, providing the bill "General prosperity, universal be passed with a suspending clause. good Health; an active spirit to promote the public Weal, the most decided and perfect Loyalty; with the utmost Harmony and good Order, in private life, as well as public Stations, prevail throughout the Province." He recommends, to fill these and future vacancies, Dr. Croke, Judge of Court of Vice-Admiralty, G. H. Monk, Justice of Supreme Court, Charles Morris, son of the deceased, and Edward B. 5 Feb Halifax Lt.-Gov. Wentworth to Evan Nepean, Sec'y to the Commissioners of the Admiralty, informing him of the death of Charles Morris, Register of the Court of Vice-admiralty for Nova Scotia. He has appointed his son, who has acted as his father's deputy, to the office for the time being, and recommends that the appointment be confirmed.

5 Feb Halifax (Copy). Vol. 53 p. 331. Lt.-Gov. Wentworth to the Lords of the Treasury. He announces the death of Henry Newton, Collector of Customs, on the 29th January, 1802. He has appointed, *ad interim*, George Thesiger to that office and also to that of Receiver of dues for Greenwich Hospital. Having secured a responsible and capable deputy, Thesiger has gone to England on three months' leave. He recommends confirmation of the appointment. Eulogy of Thesiger. (Copy). Vol. 53, p. 332.

6 Feb Halifax Lt.-Governor to Sec'y of State. (Wentworth to Hobart). He announces the death of Charles Morris, Surveyor-Gen'l of Lands and Register of the Vice-Admiralty Court, on the 26th January, and of Henry Newton, Collector of Customs for Halifax and Receiver of dues for Greenwich Hospital, on the 29th January last. He has appointed *ad interim* Charles Morris to succeed his father, and George Thesiger to succeed Mr. Newton, and recommends that the appointments be confirmed. He gives a long testimonial of the capabilities of the two appoint-

McDormand, to the Assembly, stating the necessity that has existed, realized by the inhabitants of the district around Digby and Annapolis since 1790, of a bridge over Hollingshead Creek; that they have built the bridge, expending the £47 voted for it by the County Sessions and the £13 raised by private subscription, and that they are still out of pocket £78. 6. 8. The estate which his father left was then reckoned to be worth £350, and now would be much more valuable. The petitioner asks redress. Signed. Assembly Papers, Vol. 9.

The need of another grant to complete the road is great, due to the poverty of the inhabitants and the fact that they are about to be amerced for another road (between Stewiacke and Truro). Petition of John F. Gschwind to the Assembly, asking that his petition of the previous year, praying remuneration for the expenses he incurred and his services as Health Officer for the port of Halifax in preventing the introduction of contagious diseases from the United States in 1801. They have had the place for making a bridge examined, and find that it will cost £500, of which they have subscribed £330. They have also had a road surveyed, and pray the aid of the Assembly towards completing both, "especially as your Petitioners' part of the Country within Five Miles distance consists of about Five thousand Acres of Marsh of the first Quality about one half of which is Diked and under high improvement and Are about to Dike in 1000 Acres more the Ensuing Season—which being contiguous to an Excellent Soil of upland that it may probably be so improved as to produce as much Sustenance for Man and Beast as any other part of the Universe within the same limits,..."

2. Nicholas Mosher to Sherman Denison, offering to build the bridge according to specifications for £400.

Petitioners offer to raise £100 if the legislature will provide the rest. Signed with 11 names.

The lack of a clear title to this land causes and will continue to cause uneasiness among the present settlers on it. The petitioners ask some relief, preferably other than that of subjecting them to the expense of taking out a new grant. Signed with 60 names.

Petitioners ask that the Assembly "adopt measures for laying a duty on all goods imported by transient Adventurers" and suggest "the necessity of providing two armed Vessels to cruize upon the coasts and to search in the out harbours of the province for illicit Traders." He encloses also the petition of Mr. Burke, Roman Catholic Vicar-Gen'l, which concerns the Church of England in the colony. The late winter has been very mild, and there is a good deal of sickness in the province, none of it "virulent or infectious" except the measles. (Copy). Regrets to mention that, owing to the hemp seed from Russia being bad, the culture of hemp has been a failure this year, though some good seed from the United States and some grown in the province have been fruitful. If the government still wants to encourage this industry a supply of twenty or thirty puncheons of good seed must reach the province in time for the Spring sowing. The great increase of trade on the Gulf of St. Lawrence shore, and the prevalence of illicit methods of importing and exporting make it incumbent on him "to represent....that a Custom House or Port be established at Poictou (sic)....By this measure the regulations, revenue and control of Commerce will grow with the Commerce and population, the introduction of bad habits and fraudulent interests prevented, and the profit, ease and convenience of His Majesty's subjects materially promoted and encouraged." He suggests Peter Kemble as Collector, in the event of a Custom House being established. Three hundred and seventy settlers arrived in the province from the Island of Barra, Scotland, early in August. He has settled them in the vicinity of Pictou, where they may carry on the herring fishery "hitherto too much availed by fishermen and coasting traders from the United States of America." The new and coasting traders from the United States of America." settlers are all Roman Catholics. The numbers of that sect are increasing. Since transmitting the memorial from Mr. Burke, their priest, with regard to a school, their plans have changed. He has informed the priest that he can not give his licence to the institution which they are now erecting for the charitable education of the Roman Catholic children without the Home Government's approbation. He has asked the Bishop to find out the opinion of the Archbishop of Canterbury. In Mr. Forsyth's absence, he asks for a seat in the Council for Michael Wallace "exceedingly respectable in himself and of the most pre-eminent usefulness to His Majesty's services, especially in revenue, and other legislative and executive public business, wherein, his firm loyalty, experience, wisdom and integrity are of real and daily distinguished advantage in the Administration of this Province.' The Lords of the Privy Council for Trade and Foreign Plantations have given a thorough investigation to the subject of such an establishment for Sable Island as that recommended in Wentworth's correspondence. He finds great difference of opinion in those examined. The expense would be £1500 more than the Nova Scotia legislature has granted (£1100) for further erections, £900 a year for salaries and contingent expenses, and £6000 if two lighthouses are to be erected. For the yearly expenses and to help with the further building Wentworth has suggested a duty of one penny per ton on all vessels cleared from Great Britain and Ireland for Halifax and ports north. But from the records it appears that the most this duty would yield would be about £133 a year, and it is doubtful if the trade would consent to paying the duty. He has ordered three papers (nos. 24, 25, 26) to be sent to Lord Hobart. One of the Trinity House Brethren who was examined said that all the wrecks of ships seen on the coast of the island had not occurred, there, but sometimes as far south as Florida, and that the hulks had drifted there. In the oral answers they said that two lighthouses were necessary, one at each end of the island, and that only one would be more dangerous than none; they thought also that the lanterns should differ, one being rotatory and the other stationary. Admiral Knight, one of those examined, accompanied Desbarres when he surveyed the island. "The only Person who was suggested to the Lords as acquainted with this Subject whom they did not examine, was Commissioner Duncan...but his opinion was stated from a conversation with him, by Captain George, who also told us that Captain Duncan had never been aShore on the Island." Reply of Rear-Admiral Knight to Lord Glenherbie's letter on the subject of the intended lighthouses on Sable Island. He has always. ever since he helped with surveying and exploring the island, considered that lighthouses, properly situated, a gun at each end, an establishment of men with a knowledge of the coast and swimming, a small vessel, a life boat, and other life-saving devices would go far towards lessening dangers and preserving life. He suggests that the eastern lighthouse should be on an eminence east of Mt. Knight, so that its light would not be obstructed by the hills, and that the western one might be about midway between the west extremity of the island and the pond. He thinks wood is the best material for the lighthouses, and that they might be constructed before being landed on the island, and the lanterns be lined with tin to guard against accident by fire. Offers his services in furthering the establishing of the proposed station.

(Copy). Vol. 60, no. 24. Answers of the Elder Brethren of the Corporation of Trinity House to enquiries made by the Committee of the Privy Council for Trade and Plantations. They doubt the practicability of lighthouses, since they would be obscured for so large a part of the year, and so few vessels clearing from Great Britain are in danger of Sable Island. They cite a case of a lighthouse having been erected at St. Catharine's and fallen into disuse through the fogs making it ineffectual. The usual light duty is one halfpenny per ton levied at the Custom House of the port where the ship clears out, for such lights as in the ordinary course of her voyage she is to pass. An establishment of persons would be the means of saving lives and property, but would probably do little to prevent shipwreck. Copy of report of examination of Scrope Bernard, Provincial Agent in London, with regard to the proposed establishment on Sable Island. "The erecting a LightHouse at Shelburne, I am told cost above £3000. I am also informed that both the above LightHouses (Halifax and Shelburne) are supported in part by a Tonnage Duty on Vessels entering.... Four pence per Ton upon all Nova Scotia Vessels, and Sixpence on all other Vessels British and Foreign". The amount of duty collected is not quite so much as the expence of upkeep, and the province makes good the difference. The expence of building a lighthouse on Sable Island would probably be about £3000, and the cost of maintenance about £1000 a year, £100 more than on the mainland because a higher salary would be expected by each person on the establishment.

The virulence with which this business was pursued extended in declamatory speeches, calculated to create discontent among the people at large, nor were endeavours wanting to irritate a dissention between the two Houses, which is the more extraordinary, as this Gentleman is an Officer of Government and might be expected to wish for the peace and quiet of the Community." "In page 86 of the Journals of Assembly a vote passed granting One thousand pounds to defray the expence of employing two Vessels to prevent smuggling, and one hundred pounds for two Deputys to Mr. Tonge.—The Act when sent up to the Council did not appear calculated to attain the Objects intended, altho' it might certainly have afforded great convenience to Mr. Tonge, who zealously patronized it, under whom the vessels and Deputys' were to be employed, which would be more singular as he was himself largely concerned in the traffic and export of Plaister of Paris, receiving and paying merchandize therein; In which trade it is thought the principal smuggling is practiced, And the suppression whereof was the ostensible object of the Bill..... They were however wisely non-concurred by the Council." Wentworth has prevailed on the naval commander to provide the necessary protection. Session concluded without disturbance.

He has obtained plans and estimates for constructing lighthouses from a Mr. Lincoln of Boston by which it appears that the cost for building both would be no more than £1200 sterling. The seals caught on the island would amply supply the necessary oil for light. "The observation that Foggs and thick weather which frequently prevails round that Island, would apply to all the northern Coasts of America, from St. Laurence river to Cape Hatteras, in Virginia, in all which extent of coast Light houses are beneficially established, altho' many parts of it, late experience proves to be more enveloped with Foggs, than the Isle of Sable, which is not more so than the Channel of England." The latest observations show that ships can be warned off the shoals by lights from the island.

Dr. Croke has been sworn into the Council and taken his place. Gratitude of M. Danséville for continuance of allowance granted him. The fishery is reviving. It would be greatly beneficial to the fishery if the ships carrying the fish to Europe were not forced to land their return cargoes in England. "These being restrained to an additional passage to England, landing and expenses there ruins the whole voyage, and of course compels the Nova Scotia Merchants to send their best fish to the United States, who derive all the benefit of the freight to, and

profit at the Foreign Market."

Permission to grant lands is very much wanted, and the removal of the order that vessels carrying foreign goods must call at an English port before entering a colonial port would greatly benefit the province. The indications are that the fisheries will be unusually successful this year, and that there will not be any small boats left for the exporting of plaster of Paris. The profits from that trade last year were £7000. He regrets that the Royal Nova Scotia Regiment were not given some consideration as to half pay, especially in view of another outbreak of war. Decline of Lady Wentworth's health.

Having to land such goods in England "operates such a loss in the perishable nature of the goods, and such an additional expence upon the others, that it is found more profitable to export our best fish to the United States....who freight it in their own bottoms to all the ports in (foreign) Europe, and our consumption of most of the returned articles are smuggled in upon our extensive Coasts (sic).... That during the last two years upwards of one hundred and thirty persons have been committed to this Gaol for debt, several of whom have been for three days without receiving any kind of animal or vegetable food and must have certainly perished had it not been in the Power of some others of their fellow prisoners to have afforded them a small relief from their own little stock of provisions. That the Act of the Province of the third year of His present Majesty, for relieving insolvent debtors (whose debts are under one hundred Pounds) is seldom of any benefit to Debtors in this County, as they are generally not informed that to have any relief under the said Act they must apply to swear out within fourteen days after Execution, And your Petitioners humbly beg leave to mention that since the Month of June 1803 only three or four persons have obtained the Eight pounds of Bread per Week therein Order'd." Their situation much worse than that of debtors in other colonies and Great Britain. "That in this Gaol your Petitioners are closely and regidly confined to a Room to the great injury of their health, and they are far from experiencing that Humanity. Benevolence and Attention which so eminently distinguishes the British Character in Europe above all the civilized Nations of the World. That Your Petitioners humbly take the liberty to suggest....that the situation of Debtors was preferable in Ancient Rome to their present lot in Nova Scotia, for altho' the Debtor was there liable to be sold for a term of years to satisfy his Creditor, Yet no one had the power to confine him within the Walls of a dreary prison to pine away his days under locks and Irons to the great hurt of Society and the utter ruin of himself and family, but on the Contrary the person who purchased the Debtor

was compelled to furnish him with wholsome food and Clothing, and his misery or Slavery was only for a fixed and certain time. Your Petitioners therefore, with the highest Respect most fervently pray that Your Honourable House, as the Great Guardians of the distressed and unfortunate, will take their case into your Gracious Consideration and Grant them the liberty of a Yard to walk in occasionally for the free air, and an allowance of food, or such other relief as in your Great Wisdom You shall judge proper and this they Pray not only for themselves but for the good of such unfortunate prisoners as may be hereafter confined in this most dismal and Wretched Mansion." The Council were displeased and greatly disappointed-Nor were the House of Representatives less so, when upon enquiry, it appeared that the Speaker had of his own usurped authority, prevented the Bill coming up, which they had passed and ordered—Strongly feeling the indecorum and detriment of this proceeding, The House required their Speaker forthwith to apologize to me and exculpate them, and farther appointed two of their own Members to accompany and witness that the apology was properly made—The Passing the Bill was thus delayed another day, and afforded time to land and disperse a valuable cargo, free of duty, which appeared to be the object contemplated—The loss to His Majesty's Provincial revenue amounting to £1552.3." Acts to continue the revenue laws and 9 is the appropriation act, in the usual form. 10: an experimental act for regulating the expenditure of monies for the service of roads and bridges and 12: similarly to regulate the appointment of officers for collecting impost and excise duties. 13 provides an annuity for John Newton, revenue collector. 11, 14, 15, and 16 contain nothing unusual. Remarks on the Assembly Journal: "Mr. Tonge having obtained an election to the Chair as Speaker of the House, by a Majority of one only, and very unexpectedly, I believe through some misunderstanding among the members individually, It became my duty to disapprove the Choice, having experienced the most decided opposition to His Majesty's service, during the Sessions in which Mr. Tonge was in the Chair... . From hence and his general conduct for several years past, I refused to receive him, and requiring another choice, Mr. Wilkins was elected presented and approved; and I have great pleasure in reporting that He performed the dutys of his situation during the Sessions with impartiality, diligence and decorum." Among the contested elections the case of Mr. Walker has been transmitted, seeming "to require more consideration"; he asks for the Sec'y of State's instructions concerning it. On p. 17 of the Journal is the petition of the revenue collectors of Halifax for their commission on the cargo worth £1552, which the Speaker's delaying to send the revenue bills to the Council lost to the province. The petition was granted by the House, who required the Speaker to apologize to the Lt.-Governor, as previously reported. On p. 24 the Treasurer's accounts are printed and on p. 104 his accounts as commissioner for building the Government House, "wherein the strictest investigation took place... Efforts were made to procrastinate or delay this investigation or settlement—probably that it might be used as a subject of misrepresentation among the people whose remote situations expose them to factious deceptions. But Mr. Wallace firmly persisting in his right to have his accounts settled, and being fully justified in the conclusion... has disappointed all insidious views upon that subject." A lighthouse is to be erected jointly by the governments of N. S. and N. B. on Brier Island. Suggestions as to regulating the gypsum trade were made, but nothing came of them. He omitted to state in his last despatch that Mrs. Deborah Cottnam had died on Dec. 31st 1806, and consequently her pension need no longer be included in the parliamentary grant. The revenue schooner Hunter has gone from the Gulf of St. Lawrence where it was protecting the fisheries against American encroachments, to the Bay of Fundy where it will be employed in preventing American smugglers from entering the harbours disguised as fishermen, and fishermen from annoying the inhabitants on the thinly settled harbours. He has drawn Bills of Exchange for the purchase and equipment of the vessel amounting to £810 in all, which he hopes will be paid. The British envoy extraordinary to the United States having informed him of the probability of a war with the United States, Wentworth will have the militia assembled and inspected immediately, and as many deficiencies supplied as possible. "I have great confidence in their loyalty, zeal & bravery, notwithstanding Mr. Emmett, a noted Irish Innovator now at New York relying upon co-operation of the Irish Inhabitants of this Province proposes to conquer Nova-Scotia with 7000 men-" A large frigate stationed at the entrance of the Bay of Fundy and three sloops or gun brigs and three armed cutters would be a great defence if placed at different spots up to the heads of rivers, and would protect New Brunswick also. Halifax is capable of strong defence. The need of at least three strong and well disciplined regiments to be added to the garrison is obvious. They would, besides providing a means of defence, "draw forth and combine the Energies of less experienced Regiments" and probably lead to the forming of corps of volunteers up to 4000 men. "This Portion of an Army would be had, without impairing the military strength of the Parent State-or entailing any considerable expence beyond the time of actual service. As to the fidelity of such Corps, I think, from many years experience, in which Defection was unknown, they may be fairly relied upon....Many have felt the distress and misery of having been driven from their settlements and are delighting now in a re-establishment in a good and healthful Country, under the British Government.'

"That, when His Majesty's authority began to be opposed in those Colonies. your petitioners adhered to their allegiance, and received the Royal assurance of full protection to their persons and security to their properties; That, at that period, throughout all His Majestys Colonies (without any exception) a property in Negroes was maintained and acknowledged if not encouraged; And your petitioners know not of any public act since that time, whereby such sort of property has been declared untenable-On the contrary, the Royal Proclamations and the Acts of Parliament admitting and encouraging persons of Your petitioners political principles to remove out of the United States into this province, expressly authorise them to bring their Negro Slaves,—Your petitioners are far from pretending to advocate Slavery as a System— With the creation of that System they had nothing to do—The introduction of Negro Slaves into His Majestys Colonies was at a time long before Your petitioners were born—It was authorised by the controlling authority of Parliament, in which authority the Colonies had not by representation any share-But, when Your petitioners came to the age of discretion, they found that His Majestys Colonial subjects possessed the right of holding a property in Negroes upon the same grounds that they possessed the right of holding any other species of property, and concieved that right to be as strongly guarded by law as any other of their rights or priveleges whatsoever-

But, unfortunately for Your petitioners, owing to certain doubts now entertained by the Kings Courts of Law in this Province, such property is rendered wholly untenable by Your petitioners, whose Negro Servants are daily leaving their service and setting Your Petitioners at defiance. For, if it be no longer incumbent upon the Negro who claims his liberty within a Colony, to produce the Certificate of his emancipation; or to shew that he was born of free parents—or, at the least to prove that at some former period of his life he exercised the rights of a free person, it is in vain that his possessor attempts to litigate with him—Negroes, universally thro the Colonies, passed like other chattels; sometimes by Bills of Sale, at other times by mere tradition. As in the case of other chattels, possession was a proof of property till the contrary was shewn— And Your petitioners are prepared to prove their property in the Negroes they possess against all adverse claimants—But, as Negroes are transitory, Your petitioners are not (nor from the nature of the thing is it possible they should be) prepared with a legal course of testimony, for deducing such negros Pedigree from an African Slave Ancestor,—Much less (as Colonists) are prepared, or (as they humbly concieve) in reason called upon, to maintain the legality of a System which the Parliament of Great Britain has authorised, and the Parliament of The United Kingdoms doth still allow. Leaving all subtle reasonings to better heads, Your petitioners rely, and must rely, in this, as in many other cases, upon the long established usage in His Majestys Colonies, and must humbly hope for the same rule and measure of justice here, as might, in their case, be hoped for by His Majesty free colonial subjects of any

other of his transmarine dominions-Perhaps however, the peculiar circumstances of this Province, or perhaps the true interests of Humanity, may require in this Colony, the abolition of that particular species of property claimed by your petitioners, (these however are problems that your petitioners presume not to solve) But if so, it seems but reasonable and just, that your petitioners, and others under like circumstances with them, should bear only their proportional parts of the loss or expence attending such abolition-

Upon the whole therefore, Your petitioners confiding in the chaste manly and deliberate wisdom of this House; and fully relying upon the justice integrity and honor of this Assembly, Most humbly pray: That their Case may be taken under Your Consideration, and that either such regulations may be made as in your wisdom shall be deemed expedient for securing Your petitioners property in their Negro Servants,— Or, that, if such property is to be sacrificed to the public good, Your petitioners may, from that public, receive their equitable compensation". 26 names signed. "Whereas the Bounty p Quintal on the actual export of the fish in our vessels, put on board and cleared out under the eyes of our Custom House Officer and a Certificate returned of its being actually landed in some one or other of our Islands is not so liable to fraud and is undoubtedly a more Certain method of ensuring the supply Wished for.

The disagreement on this Bill with the House of Assembly, arose from the wish of the Council to have the Bounty on the export to the West Indies, and the House insisting on its being Payable on the Outfitt of the Vessels, And, to the disposition which ever has and will continue in a greater or less degree in popular Assembly's.

His Majesty's Council nowise engaged in the fisheries, could have no Interest or views in opposing the System, but such as in their Judgment were best calculated to promote the general interests of the Province and His Majestys Dominions, and to Comport with the Statutes made in England for that purpose—a Bounty of 1/6 p. Lt.-Gov. (Wentworth) to Sec'y of State (Castlereagh). The session of the General Assembly was concluded on the 4th February. The

decision of the Crown lawyers as to vacating seats did not arrive until the Assembly had prorogued; meanwhile another case had arisen which he could not accede to until the arrival of the decision. "This, however just and reasonable, was embraced as an opportunity to display great pretension to patriotism in popular speeches, declamations and addresses. The revenue bills passed, after the usual delay. On the advice of the Council writs were issued for elections in the two vacated seats and the Speaker informed thereof. The Council and House differed concerning the appropriating of the grant for bounties to encourage the fisheries, the Council holding out for the method of the previous year of a bounty on the number of quintals exported to the British colonies, the Assembly wishing to revert to that preceding last year, of bounties on the tonnage of vessels engaged in fishing. Consequently no bounty was finally granted. "The mode preferred by the Council is without all doubt most eligible, because with the encouragement and aid to fishing, it also conveys an aid and encouragement to export and secure the supply to the British colonies instead of carrying a large proportion to the United States, from whence it is exported and affords a very interesting supply to foreign and now hostile Colonies. The evil still proceeds, the produce in the United States furnishing the means of payment for East India and foreign European Goods to be smuggled into these Provinces, which is indeed profitable to the Schooner interest contended for but obviously detrimental to every other British interest upon which it bears. These however have such an increased connection that it was agreed by the Assembly to instruct the provincial Agent to address your Lordship praying a direction to the Council to consent to the mode required by the house only-which would further gratify those who seek to subvert the influence and independence of the Council....Upon a steady support of this body, their selection and rank among themselves and in society, will greatly depend the peace, prosperity and proper attachments to Great Britain of this, and all the other Colonies on this Continent. The political influence which has for several years past excited an enthusiasm in the public mind in most countries, under the specious name of amendment of constitutions of Government require only a firm support of the measures and members of Government to prevent the nominal amendments from extending into actual prostration of legitimate authority. This will be found to be peculiarly applicable to Colonial establishments.

There are plenty of provisions in the province, so the American embargo has brought no inconvenience. A large supply is also being prepared for exportation to the Windward Islands. There could have been a surplus of flour and bread, if the Contractor had been supplied by the manufacturing merchants of Halifax. Advantages that would accrue if this were the case. Lawrence Hartshorne, appointed Agent to the Contractor for supplies in the Windward Islands, will need a licence to import salt provisions, which will go with the other provisions from this province. The bad effect of the American embargo on their fisheries may determine many fishermen to remove to Nova Scotia, if they should be allowed to register their vessels and import their household goods. "In consequence it was only a few days ago I assumed the Civil Administration nor have I as yet taken possession of the Government House—an Edifice out of all proportion to the situation, and the cause of my predecessor's reduced circumstances, notwithstanding the increase his income derived from his situation of Surveyor of Woods." He hopes his salary will be made as much as that of the Lt.-Governor of Lower Canada. Since Mr. Uniacke has withdrawn from the House he has appointed him a member of Council. He asks that Cooke have his mandamus made out, "in conformity to the arrangement made respecting this event, some years ago." Assembly is to meet on the 19th May to revise and amend the militia law. He has had the province divided into districts to enable the inspecting officers to attend to the training and instruction of the militia. 3000 is about the effective strength of the militia in N. S., 700 in N. B. and 400 between C. B. and P. Edward Islands. "That part of the Militia Forces which I found embodied promises to be of great utility (if properly trained) in the hour of danger." Although Wentworth's financial arrangements with regard to them were expensive, according to Government standards, he cannot see that there was any possible way of lessening them. He has sent a sloop of war with letters to Boston and "a respectable and intelligent Inhabitant of Halifax, first to Boston, then Washington, Norfolk, and New York, with the Instructions contained in no. 1" (Enclosure). He wishes Mr. George to be appointed Secretary, Registrar and Clerk of the Council, but does not want those offices combined with that of Secretary to the Governor of Annapolis, a military post which he wishes Capt. Ligertwood to fill. He will report to Lord Chatham on the state of the defences, of which "Ruin and desolation is the characteristic feature." He encloses the Supt. of Indians' report and wishes to know if Government approves making occasional presents to them. He has not "lost sight of your suggestions respecting the advantages which may be taken of enmities, of factions, of civil dissentions, of private ambition and the jealousy conceived by the States; and....have taken steps to foment those various passions as they arise. "The Floridas are represented as weak and almost defenceless. Might not the possession of them thwart some of Bonapartes political designs? If hostilities with the United States do not take place, the force for such an operation might be drawn from hence." Information regarding the ownership, situation, and size of Moose Island in Passamaquoddy Bay. "The Americans have a Custom House, and other Establishments there. A considerable Trade is carried on in Fish, which they purchase uncured from our Fishermen and pay for in adulterated Brandy, bad Tea, and other refuse goods; the place being peculiarly well situated for a smuggling Trade."

P.S. Mr. Uniacke had just informed him of an arrangement made for his son to succeed to three of the posts vacated by the death of Benning Wentworth (Sec'y, Registrar and Clerk of Council). "I can only say that, in the event of that Gentleman succeeding to those Offices without adverting to the circumstances I have stated or communicating with me thereon, he will be less objectionable than Mr. Wentworth."

They are not at all under the control, or influence, of any individuals, either in, or out, of the House; but the Government of the Province has always a considerable power over them, from its means of bestowing little favours and advantages upon the members and their friends. By the increase of shipping caused by the embargo the revenue of the province has increased £3000 in the last year. Croke objects to the Bishop of Nova Scotia superseding him in the Council, as Prevost recommended. Having been appointed by a special Mandamus, he thinks

"The Memorial of Nathaniel Parker humbly sheweth that your Memorialist in February A.D. 1798 went through the woods to Liverpool for the purpose of soliciting the people of that township to assist in making a Road from thence to Annapolis township—That the said people of Liverpool furnished him with an Indian for a Guide and two men to mark said road and agreed to cut half way if it should be found practicable to make a road—That your Memorialist after his return from Liverpool, by his exertions procured a Subscription from the inhabitants of Annapolis amounting to about one hundred pounds for the purpose of cutting said road—That he spent Seventeen days in exploring and making necessary alterations in said road, lest the labour should be expended in places where it must necessarily be lost by reason of alterations after the expenditure—That your Memorialist with Mr. Foster Woodberry of Willmot, and another man with them, went thro' on the

marked line and bargained with the Committee, appointed by the inhabitants of Liverpool, whereby it was agreed that the inhabitants of Liverpool should cut one half, and the people of Annapolis the other half of said road, a day being agreed upon for the completion of said work—That your Memorialist superintended the opening of the Annapolis part of said road, and that by reason of the insufficiency of the Subscription-money to complete the work he paid more than Fourteen pounds of his own money towards the completion of the same—That in the year 1798 your Memorialist paid the sum of Four pounds, twelve shillings and eight pence towards procuring a plan of said road—That in the year 1802 your Memorialist attended the whole time a survey was made by virtue of a warrant from Government, to lay out lots on said road—for which he got but little recompence—That in May A.D. 1803 your Memorialist went to Halifax and made proposals to Government for procuring Settlers on said road which being complied with, he received a Commission for that purpose by which means 44 persons have been induced to settle thereon, 28 of which are married men, and that the present number of inhabitants on the said road (including men, women and children) amounts to one hundred and Sixty one-That your Memorialist has spent much time in going to said road for the purpose of shewing the Settlers their Lots, and otherwise to assist and encourage the said Settlement—That your Memorialist having never received any compensation for his said Extra Services, Therefore humbly prays that his said services may be taken into consideration, and rewarded by granting him the sum of Fifty pounds, or in such a manner as to the honble house of Representatives in General Assembly convened may appear most proper—And your Memorialist, as in duty bound will ever pray."

In my opinion therefore, should this Bill pass into a law, it will be a violation of the King's prerogative, as it applies several sums of Money to services, which have not been recommended to the consideration of the General Assembly by his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor"....

"Secondly—The practice of the Council, in agreeing to Votes of the house of Assembly for granting Monies before the same have been recommended by the Governor is Contrary to the Principles settled between the Council and house of Assembly so long ago as when Sir Thomas Andrew Strange was President of the Council; when, to obviate the inconvenience of their being no public officer in the house of Assembly authorised to make the house acquainted with the opinion of the Governor on any motion for granting Money; and to avoid any infringement on the prerogatives of the crown, it was agreed, that the house should in future send to the Council every Vote for granting Money distinct & separate, whereby the Council from its more intimate connection with the Governor, would previous to acting on such Votes be enabled to know his pleasure as to each particular service; and would govern themselves accordingly. In consequence of this adjustment, the House of Assembly ever since have sent all votes of Money for any new service to the Council, distinct & unconnected with any other service, and in my opinion the Council by acting upon such votes or resolutions, before they have been officially informed of the opinion of the Governor as to the service proposed, does in that respect depart from the good understanding which had taken place between the two houses, and,

to have a tendency to prevent the house of Assembly in future from

sending its resolutions separately to the Council.'

This Bill contains the grant of Monies for all services which...the Lieutenant Governor has thought proper to recommend for the support of His Majestys' Government, during the present session; and also contains large appropriations of Money for divers other services, which so far as I can obtain information, have not been recommended to either house by His Excellency." The passing of a bill in this form "is in my opinion a proceeding highly dangerous, and unconstitutional...and has an obvious tendency to compel him (the Lt.-Governor) either to give his Assent to Measures such as he May disapprove of, or...to reject the whole supply which the public necessities of His Majesty's Government demand." The latter "Course of proceeding is liable to great objection at all times, but particularly so, at the present, as the Province by a similar measure, was but lately involved in very great embarrassment & Confusion.

Fourthly, he has urged these reasons in Council constantly. my representations...have failed, from an opinion which prevails that the freedom and independence of the Council in its legislative capacity, would be violated were it restrained from taking into Consideration votes of money for the public service, Until the same had been recommended by the Governor. This is an opinion I think highly erroneous and unconstitutional, and I have with grief observed the weight it has had with most of His Majesty's Council, who I firmly believe to be faithful servants of the crown, & zealous supporters of the King's just prerogative." He produces this protest "Not with an intention to induce any honourable Member to Vote against passing the Bill, but solely with a view to my own justification, & to submit my opinion to liberal and Candid investigation in the hope that such inquiry may produce good & salutary measures to govern our future practice". London committee.

Review of articles of treaty: Art. 2, settling boundaries, has been a source of dispute, still unsatisfied, Art. 3, giving Americans fishing rights, has been grossly abused by U. S., Art. 4, allowing loyalists to recover debts, hindered in execution by U. S., Art. 5, re restoration of lost property, not carried out by U. S., Art. 6 of amnesty, followed by persecution, Art. 7 depended on Great Britain and was ultimately carried out, Art. 8, re Mississippi navigation, was subject of American aggression, Articles 9 and 10, not admitting of dispute, were fulfilled.

In 1794 East and West Indies were laid open to U. S., who took advantage by sending larger ships than were permitted. American aggression towards Louisiana and Florida, and American friendship for France prove her degradation. Prevalent idea that eastern section of U.S. is friendly to Great Britain shown to be false by their bad treatment of British soldiers and sailors. No hope of an election reversing policy, since parties are so nearly balanced. Committee hint that England should not trust U. S. who believe that the end justifies the means. Commercial eagerness of every American. Bad effect of competition between varied American cargoes, which can obtain cash, and British colonial cargoes, limited to fish, lumber and country produce. Progress of commerce with West Indies during three periods (1) 1783-1793, (2) 1794-1806, (3) 1807-1813, since Treaty of Versailles, shows harm that American intercourse does to British colonial trader. If Americans are admitted to W. I. by treaty, northern colonies "will remain in perpetual infancy, and not have the power to supply the Islands when a sudden fit of displeasure may seize hold of the Government of the United States." Special request that no repetition of Art. 3 of 1783 treaty be allowed. American intercourse fatal to morals of colonials since "the sentiments, habits and manners, both political and Moral of the lower Order of the Americans are dangerous and contaminating in a very great degree—It is the first wish of the Petitioners to see these Colonies completely, British; this will, ever, be found their surest defence and greatest blessing; but the intercourse permitted by that fatal article of the definitive Treaty was detrimental to their duty as Subjects and to every other object which in this address, the Petitioners have in view." Petitioners hope that possession by England of Passam Acadie (sic) islands will be insisted upon, according to Art. 2. They ask Govt. to initiate action in Cape Breton to prevent smuggling of gypsum, which N. S. and N. B. may follow. They urge that St. Pierre and Miquelon be not returned to France, and that Americans be not allowed on shores and surrounding waters. If Americans are prohibited from W. I. free ports might be made (as by Order-in-Council of 1809); if so, "every principle of sound policy will confine the intercourse within very narrow limits, which the Petitioners are of opinion ought not to exceed the ports of Saint John in N. Under these circumstances the Legislature ventured to pass the enclosed Act. I believe complaints were made against it by the Merchants, I am at a loss to know how the then Lieut. Gov. conceived himself justified in giving his assent to the Act notwithstanding the inhibition contained in the Royal Instructions. The Act was carried into effect and was not disallowed by His Majesty, was found productive, and considered equitable in its operation. The Law was continued, after the demands against the Province were paid off & discharged and the Duties imposed by this Act from long use are now considered among our regular Sources Unless the legislature of New Brunswick proceed "with great caution" he fears that they will not obtain the benefit of such an act and that the Nova Scotia act may be discontinued.

5th.—Because, despite large contributions and public help to the school for the past year and a half "no evidence of any sort has been produced to shew, that any Material improvement has been made," either in the learning or morals of the children attending that school.'

6th.—Because the morals of the master of the school set a bad example to the pupils and would render such a grant a violation of public

decorum "disgraceful to the Legislature of this province".

7th.—Because the whole Council had already refused a similar, though differently worded, resolution, and the present one has only passed in the absence of two of the members. This course of proceeding establishes a precedent "contrary to parliamentary rule, and which exposes the Legislature of the province to the intrigues of designing Man, and makes its proceedings liable to undue and improper influence.'
