

Post operative Diagnosis: Stab Wound of the abdomen with evisceration of the small bowel and colon.

Post operative Diagnosis: Stab wound of the abdomen with perforation of colon, tear into the midd colic artery, tear into superior mesenteric vein, huge retroperitoneal hematoms with possible tear into the abdominal acrts.

WINDINGS: (including condition of all organs examined) and PROCEDURES (Including incision ligatures, sutures, drainage, sponge count and closure):-

NAME OF OPERATION: Laparotomy, Repair of the superior mesenteric vein and ligation of the branch of the middle colic artery and a transverse colostomy.

Patient was brought in from the emergency room in a state of shock with no blood pressure, no pulse and with rapid respirations who was pale. Patient was prepared after giving three IP's and giving four units of O positive blood in order to bring pressure, however, with no luck, was best felt to do a laparotomy in spite of the critical situation and he was brought in from the emergency room directly to the operating room. He was prepared in the operating room and under general anesthetic an incision above and below the stab wound was made and this was converted into a paramedian incision. No tear into the small bowel was encountered but there was a tear into the midtransverse colon and there was free spillage of fecal material into the peritoneal cavity. Huge retroperitoneal hematoma extending from the level under the esophagus right down to the iliac crest on the left side. Although the aorta was palpated and as it appears pulsatile but this probably was secondary to a stab wound into the sorts which was sealed off into the petroperitoneal space. This was not touched with a fear of a bright bleeding already present into the peritoneal cavity. Large sized opening was seen to the superior mesenteric vein with a free bleeding of this area. This opening closed with 5 0 vascular suture and the superior mesenteric vein was repaired after dissecting proximal end. Then branch of the middle colic vessel which was bleeding, having passed the knife through the area, was ligated. The colon was exteriorized and there was a large amount of blood into the stomach, small bowel and the colon. The patient had brisk bleeding although the site could probably be a stress ulceration. However, the stomach was not opened due to the critical nature and there was no obvious laceration or tear seen into the stomach. The bowel was placed into the peritoneal cavity which again could not be praced because of this huge hematoma occupying the entire abdominal cavity. There was some free bleeding. Again it was all from the retroperitoneum space and a through and through

5 U mersilene sutures were applied to close the abdomen after exteriorizing the perforated colonic part. This was the midtransverse colon and at the site where the vessel was injured. The patient, in spite of this, has not had any urine output and he was transported to Recovery Room on the respirator, having received over 12 pints of blood to combat hypovolemia and 4 pints of lactate ringer solution.

S: (including condition of all organs examined) and PROCEDURES (Including inclaimligatures, sutures, drainage, sponge count and closure):-

Patient who has been in a critical condition since operation, was brought in the O.R. with pressu ranging from 40 to 50 of a systolic and the wound was opened from the xiphoid to the pubis. The small bowel was violaceous. The colon was already violaceous. The bowel was retracted and the hematoma in the retroperitoneal space was extended considerably since last night at first exploration. Because of this, Dr. Dave put a pressure on the aorta behind the esophagus and with pressure behind the esophagus, the aorta was dissected. With this dissection, there was a gush of bleeding and we lost the control of the aorta at this point. Because of losing control, an immediate thoracotomy was done through a left thoracic incision cutting the two costal cartilages and going between the 6th rib intercostal space. The aorta was clamped in the chest with a Satinsky clamp. Then opening was seen into the aorta distally which was just below the level of the renal vein. This opening was quite large and was closed with 4 0 silk suture. Once the hemostasis was achieved and the opening was closed, the pressure packs were applied and the sorta clamps were slowly released. After releasing the clamps, there was some increase in the blood pressure and attention was drawn to close the thoracotomy wound. The thoracotomy wound was closed with an interrupted chromic suture. Hemostasis was achieved. Continuous sutures were applied into the muscles and the fascia. Skin closed with black silk sutures and a chest tube was inserted for thoracic drainage. Following this, attention was drawn to the abdominal incision and there was some oozing and bright bleeding from the retroperitoneal space which was not from the aortic opening. However, we were unable to visualize this area but the posterior peritoneum was closed with continuous sutures to achieve hemostasis posteriorly. Then the small bowel was violaceous although there was no frank gangrene but there was extensive color change into the small bowel which involved almost the small bowel, two feet f:) the ligament of Treitz all the way to the terminal ilium of the transverse colon was also gangrenous where the previous perforation was encountered and this was exteriorized in the



DONALD MARSHALL, JR. did at Sydney, in the County of Cape Breton, Province of Nova Scotia, on or about the 28th day of Nay, 1971, murder Sanford William (Sandy) Seale, contrary to Section 218(2) of the Criminal Code of Canada."

STATEMENT OF FACTS

On the 27th May, 1971 (a Saturday night) a dance was being held at a local hall (St. Joseph's Parish Hall) with a number of the witnesses in attendance. Near midnight the participants at the dance began to leave.

A Mr. John Pratico met the accused and the deceased, Sandy Seale, at the corner of Argyle and George Streets in Sydney, and was invited by the accused to go into Wentworth Park with them by the accused. Mr. Pratico did not like the way the invitation was extended so he declined and proceeded alone up Argyle St. to Crescent Street which skirts the edge of Wentworth Park. He proceeded along Crescent Street until he neared the intersection of Crescent Street and Bentinck Street. There he stepped behind a shrub in Wentworth Park in order to consume a pint bottle of beer. While behind this shrub he saw the accused and the late Mr. Seale walk along Crescent Street and engage in an argument, or at least a loud discussion. As he watched he saw the accused remove a knife from his right hand pocket and plunge it into the stomach of the deceased. He then panicked and ran from the scene to his home.

Meanwhile one Maynard Vincent Chant will testify that he missed his bus to his home at Louisbourg and that he proceeded down Bentinck Street, and coming to the railroad tracks that run through Wentworth Park he proceeded along these railroad tracks as a short-cut to George Street where he intended to hitch-hike a drive home. As he walked along the tracks he noticed, and can identity, Nr. John Pratico sitting behind a shrub watching two men in an argument on Crescent Street. He proceeded about thirty feet beyond Nr. Pratico and stopped to observe what was going on. He knew both the accused and Nr. Seale and he saw Nr. Marshall, the accused, draw a knife from his pocket and plunge it into the abdomen of Nr. Seale, the deceased.

He panicked and ran down the tracks and cut over a path to Byng Avenue, another street skirting Wentworth Park on the opposite side from Crescent Street.

While on Byng Avenue he saw the accused running down Bentinck Street and turn into Byng Avenue towards him. Mr. Chant turned to walk in the opposite direction when the accused caught up to him and told him that he and his friend, Mr. Seale, had been attacked by two man, one stabbed his friend, Mr. Seale, in the abdomen and he received a cut in the arm defending himself. This conversation took place in front of a house occupied by a Mr. Mattson, a former R.C.M.P. officer, who is expected to testify.

The accused showed Nr. Chant his forearm that was injured but no blood was in appearance. These two men stopped a passing automobile, the operator unknown, and were taken back to the scene where Nr. Seale was still alive, but beyond reasonable senses. Help was then summoned. Mr. Chant at first related to the police the story the accused gave him but later advised that he related the false story because of fear of the accused. He knew and can identify both men involved in the offence.

DR. M. A. NACVIE DR. D. GALM will testify as to the identification of the deceased and the efforts put forth to save his life and the cause of death.

<u>CARL MacDONALD</u> will introduce the plans of Wentworth Park and the surrounding streets and area.

ROY GOULD will testify that he loaned the jacket in question to the accused on the night in question, that it was in good condition on the evening in question and its condition on recovery from the father of the accused. It was blood stained and torm.

DONALD MARSHALL, SENIOR, who is the father of the accused, will testify that he returned the jacket to its owner, Mr. Roy Gould.

. . .

DET. MICHAEL R. MacDONALD, a member of the City of Sydney Police Force, took the exhibit jacket from Mr. Gould and took it to the R.C.M.P. Crime Laboratory in Sackville, N.B.

PATRICIA ANN HARRIS, who is fourteen years of age, will testify that she left the dance with Terry Gushue at approximately 11 P.M. They went into Wentworth Park to the bendshell where they spent some time. Then they proceeded along Grescent Street at approximately 11:45 P.M. where they met the accused, and another man who she cannot identify. A conversation took place and they continued along to her home. Miss Harris had known the accused before.

TERRANCE PATRICK GUSHUE will give the same evidence as Miss Harris.

MAYNARD VINCENT CHANT, who is fourteen years of age and lives in Louisbourg, will testify that he missed the bus that was going to Louisbourg and that he walked down Bentinck Street to the railway tracks that run through Wentworth Park. As he walked along the tracks he noticed John Pratico hunched behind a bush watching something on Crescent Street. Mr. Chant stopped to see what Mr. Pretico was observing and sew two men talking to each other. Mr. Chant saw the accused haul a knife out of his pocket and drive it into the stomech of the other man. This other man keeled over and Mr. Chant ran away towards George Street. He cut off into a path to Byng Avenue. As he proceeded along Byng Avenue he saw the accused running down Bentinck Street and turn into Byng Avenue. Mr. Chant turned around but the accused caught up to him in front of a house occupied by Mr. M. Matteon. Here the accused showed his arm and said "Look what they did to me". The accused told him that two men attacked he and his buddy and that the buddy was over at the park with a knife in his stomach. The accused stopped a passing car and he and Mr. Chant were driven over to Crescent Street where Mr. Chant placed his shirt on the stomach of Mr. Seale. Mr. Chant remained there until Mr. Seale was taken away in the ambulance.

JOHN PRATIOD will testify that he knew the accused and met him near the corner of George Street and Argyle Street. He declined an invitation by the accused to go into Wentworth Park. He then went down Argyle Street to Crescent, which he walked along until he came to a bush which he went behind in order to have a pint of beer. As he was there he saw the accused and the deceased talking or arguing, he saw the accused haul something from his pocket and stab Seale. Seale dropped and Mr. Pratico ran away from the scene. Mr. Pratico knew both Mr. Marshall and Mr. Seale before the night in question.

ROBERT MacKAY, who was attending the dance, left with Miss Debbie
MacPherson around 11:40 P.M. They sat at the bandshell in Wentworth Park
for a few minutes, then proceeded along Crescent Street. As they walked
along they saw Sandy Seale lying on the street. He asked for help because
he was stabbed. Mr. MacKay sent Miss MacPherson on her way and ran for
help. He returned just as the automobile with the accused returned to
the scene. Mr. MacKay and the accused went to a house to ask for an
ambulance to be called.

BRIAN DOUCETTE will testify that he was asked by the accused and another man to call an ambulance. When the ambulance arrived Mr. Doucette accompanied the ambulance to the hospital. The accused showed Mr. Doucette his injured arm and there was no blood.

LEO CURRY will testify that he was the ambulance driver that took Mr. Seale to the hospital and stayed with the deceased until the doctor arrived.

PEARL MacMILLAN, a lab technician at the Sydney City Hospital, will testify that she typed the blood of Sandy Seale and found it to be "O" positive.

DR. MOHAN S. VIRICK will testify that he examined Donald Marshall and found that he had a laceration on the left arm which he sutured. There was no bleeding from this cut. It was a superficial laceration.

MRS. MERLE FAYE DAVIS will testify that she is a nurse at the Sydney City Hospital and that she examined Donald Marshall on his arrival at the Hospital. She will describe the condition of Mr. Marshall's arm and that there was no blood on the arm when he entered the hospital.

MR. ALDOPHUS JAMES EVERS will testify that he is with the R.C.M.P. Grime Laboratory in Sackville. He will testify that he received the Exhibits from Sgt. Michael MacDonald on June 16th, 1971. These exhibits were a light brown jacket and a bright yellow jacket. He passed these exhibits on to Miss Mrazek. He will then describe the conditions of the exhibits.

MISS SANDRA MRAZEK, from the R.C.M.P. Crime Laboratory, will explain her examination of the two exhibits and also of a piece of Kleenex given to her as an exhibit.



He said he was there and a fellow got life for it and he had nothing to do with it. So I asked him how he didn't go to the police. He said he was scared. He said the gur said for him to forget about it. He said he saw the fellow stab the fellow in the Park. He said the Indian guv had his hand behind his back.

- A. Yes, but 1 can't remember the name. It sounded French. Jim went and laid down. I asked my sister Florence about it and my brother David. Thew said he should go to the police. Statement of James William McNeil, age 25 yrs., residing at 1007 Rear George St., Sydney:

Myself and Roy Ebsary were at the State Tavern, George St., Sydney, late in the evening in May of this year. We were there about an hr. or so. We left. We walked down George St. and took the short cut through the Park (Wentworth). We came up to Crescent St. and while walking along Crescent St. we were approached by an Indian & a colored fellow from behind. The Indian put my right hand up behind my back. The colored fellow said dig man dig. Then Roy Ebsary said I got something for you. He put his hand in his right pocket and took out a knife and drove it into the colored fellow's side

- A. The left hand side of the colored fellow. I seen Roy's hand & knife full ob blood
- Q. Did you see the Indian being stabbed
- A. No. I did not

On the authorization of the OIC C.I.B., "H" Divi-GENERAL: sion, a polygraph examination was administered to the following persons on 23 Nov 71 at Sydney, N.S.

- 1. James William MacNEIL
- 2. Roy Newman EBSARY

Before taking the examination both subjects signed forms stating that they were taking the test voluntarily. Particulars of this offence were provided by Insp. E.A. MARSHALL.

The main issue under consideration in the polygraph PURPOSE: examination was whether or not these subjects were telling the truth with reference to their knowledge of the above-noted offence.

- DATA: (a) There were indications of truthfulness in EBSARY's polygraph recordings when he answered "No" to the following test questions:
 - 1. Around the end of May this year do you know for sure who stabbed Sandy SEAL?
 - 2. Around the end of May this year did you stab Sandy SEAL?
 - 3. Around the end of May this year were you right there when Sandy SEAL was stabbed?
 - 4. Around the end of May this year did you wash blood off a knife?

(b) Throughout MacNEIL's examination there were irregular and erratic reactions to the test questions. These variations are the type which prevent an analysis of the charts and I can render no opinion as to whether or not MacNEIL was telling the truth when he answered "Yes" to the following test questions:

- 1. Around the end of May this year did Roy really stab Sandy?

- 4. Around the end of May this year did you see Roy washing blood off his knife?

CONCLUSIONS:

It is my opinion, based on EBSARY's polygraph examination, that he was telling the truth to his questions.

REMARKS: It will be noted that I gave an indefinite opinion as to MacNEIL's polygraph examination, however, the following should be added. This subject was interviewed after the examination and on a number of occasions was quite ready to admit that he was lying and that he was only "joking" when he said that EBSARY had stabbed SEAL. He would then revert to his original story. I believe that his mind was open to anything that might be suggested to him. Under the circumstances I do not feel that he is mentally capable of responding to a polygraph examination and for that reason no other tests were administered. I do feel, however, that EBSARY was truthful with reference to his polygraph examination.

- 2. The offence took place around midnight of the 28/29 May 71 (Friday evening Saturday morning) in Wentworth Park in the City of Sydney. SEALE was stabbed once in the abdomen with a rather large weapon (blade about 3/4" wide and at least 4" long). The deceased underwent an emergency operation, but, expired at 8:00 A.M. on Saturday, the 29 May 71. Although conscious a number of times after the assault, he did not name his assailant. MARSHALL denied being the murderer, both to the police when interrogated and later on the stand during the trial. The weapon has never been recovered. Intensive investigation by the Sydney City Police was commenced and MARSHALL arrested on the 4 June 71. His Counsel, C.M. Rosenblum, has applied for leave to appeal the conviction.
- After sentence was passed, one James William McNEIL, age 25 years, came forward and said that he was with a man by the name of Roy EBSARY during the evening of the 29 May 71 and that he, EBSARY, had in fact murdered SEALE in Wentworth Park. McNEIL was interviewed by Sydney City Police and the Prosecuting Officer for Cape Breton County, Donald C. MacNEIL, Q.C., on Monday the 15 Nov. 71. Roy EBSARY was picked up and interviewed and he denied murdering SEALE, although he did say that McNEIL and himself were in the park, after visiting a tavern during the evening of the 28 May 71 and that he and McNEIL became involved in an altercation with two men (later determined through investigation to be MARSHALL and SEALE). According to McNEIL and EBSARY, MARSHALL and SEALE attempted to rob them in the park. This altercation, which obviously happened prior to the murder, was not known to the police until McNEIL came forward on the 15 Nov. 71. At this point the Force became involved and I went to Sydney on the 16 Nov. 71 where, together with Sgt. G.M. McKINLEY, i/c Sydney G.I.S., a thorough review of the case was conducted with the following results.

4. From the outset of our investigation it was apparent the use of the polygraph would be extremely useful. A request was therefore made for this equipment and the operator and the necessary authority received for Cpl. E. C. SMITH, "F" Division, to proceed to Sydney to assist with this investigation.

Sgt. McKINLEY received McNEIL's written permission that he would undergo the polygraph test. We interviewed McNEIL and it was obvious by his demeanour and speech that he has sub-normal intelligence and is slightly mental. He was, nonetheless, convinced that EBSARY had stuck a knife into the deceased and that later they went to EBSARY's home where he, EBSARY, washed off the knife. Because we were certain that McNEIL's account of the altercation insofar as it concerned EBSARY allegedly stabbing MARSHALL was a figment of his imagination, we did not immediately question him or take any further action with respect to McNEIL at this time. Rather, a number of hours were spent by Sgt. McKINLEY and myself going over statements given by various witnesses to the police during the initial investigation and later and visiting the scene of the crime with Sergeant of Detectives John MacINTYRE, Sydney Police Department, and additionally perusing transcripts of evidence given at the preliminary hearing and some transcripts of evidence given in high court during the trial.

6. Without quoting all the evidence, the following are the salient points given by key witnesses of the events leading up to and following the stabbing. Kindly refer to the attached diagram which will illustrate and clarify much of the evidence given at the trial.

Maynard Vincent CHANT (Age 14 at time of murder - now Age 15)

Testified that he was walking down the railway tracks in Wentworth Park just prior to the stabbing. He first saw a person later identified as John Lawrence PRACTICO hiding in the bushes between the railway tracks and Crescent Street. He also saw two men, one of whom he recognized as Donald MARSHALL, standing close to each other on Crescent Street. He heard mumbling and swearing and he thought MARSHALL was doing most of the swearing. He then saw MARSHALL take out a knife from his pocket and jab it into the man he was with. CHANT became frightened at this point and ran down the railway tracks to Byng Avenue. During this time MARSHALL also walked over to Byng Avenue and met CHANT along with two other boys and two girls (these persons have never been located or identified). MARSHALL told the group that two men had attacked he and 'his Buddy' (SEALE). He also showed them a superficial cut on his arm, which was not bleeding, incidentally. He stated that his Buddy (SEALE) was on the other side of the Park with a knife in his stomach. then came along (neither the car or its driver were identified) and they (MARSHALL, CHANT and the occupants of the car) drove around to where SEALE was lying on the street. MARSHALL took care not to stand where SEALE could see him. CHANT took off his shirt and put it over SEALE's stomach while waiting for the ambulance.

John Lawrence PRACTICO (Age 16 Years)

PRACTICO attended the dance at St. Joseph's Hall, Sydney

until shortly before midnight, when he left by himself. He met MARSHALL and SEALE and they walked to the corner of Argyle and George Streets. MARSHALL wanted PRACTICO to come down into the Park. (Although PRACTICO never admitted or suggested that MARSHALL and SEALE were going into the park to attempt to 'roll' someone, the inference is there and it is the concensus of opinion MARSHALL and SEALE were, at this time, bent on robbing someone). PRACTICO then proceeded into the Park on his own and sat down in the bushes to drink a pint of beer when he saw SEALE and MARSHALL on Crescent Street. He testified that he was about thirty or forty feet from them at this time and that he heard an argument take place between the two during which SEALE is alleged to call MARSHALL a 'crazy Indian' and MARSHALL called SEALE a 'black bastard'. PRACTICO saw MARSHALL plunge a weapon into SEALE's side, SEALE fall to the ground and then MARSHALL running up Crescent Street towards Argyle Street. PRACTICO then ran to his home on Bentinck Street.

Neither of the two aforementioned witnesses told the truth to the police when they were first interviewed. However, this can be put down to the fact they were both scared and that PRACTICO is not too bright. In the final analysis evidence, which was as outlined above is believed to be factual and, what is just as important, there was no collaboration between the two. In other words, what the court had were the same facts told by two quite independent witnesses.

Terrence GUSHUE (Age 20)

GUSHUE also attended the dance at St. Joseph's Hall, but, left about 10:30 P.M. with a young girl. They were in the Park for some time and in fact saw and had conversation with MARSHALL and SEALE, although they did not know SEALE at the time. They did not witness the murder, but, could put both MARSHALL and SEALE on Crescent Street prior to the stabbing.

7. Some of the exhibits, particularly the jacket MARSHALL was wearing the night of the murder was examined. This light-weight yellow jacket was found to have the left sleeve cut and ripped. There were also some light blood stains on the left front portion of the jacket (see attached diagram) in such a position as to strongly indicate MARSHALL wiped his forearm on it. There were no blood stains on the inside of the sleeve, although MARSHALL led investigators to believe he had also been knifed during the scuffle with two unidentified men just prior to SEALE being stabbed. There was an insufficient RE: OBJET:

quentity of blood on MARSHALL's jacket to have it typed. CHANT stated that the cut on MARSHALL's arm was not bleeding when he saw him on Byng Avenue. Although the cut was superficial, it was sutured at the hospital. While in gaol, MARSHALL removed the bandage from his arm and flushed it down the toilet and even removed the sutures himself, suggesting that he did not want to have anything around with his blood on that could be picked up by the police from which his blood type might be determined. There are on the jacket what appears to be hesitation marks caused by a knife, and I am firmly convinced MARSHALL inflicted the slight cut on his arm after he stabbed SEALE to add credence to his story.



- 8. Cpl. E.C. SMITH conducted the polygraph tests on both McNEIL and EBSARY. His report is attached and indicates EBSARY is telling the truth when he answered "no" to the question, "Did you stab SEALE?" With respect to McNEIL's test, please note Cpl. SMITH cannot give an opinion as to whether or not he is telling the truth. Post-examination questioning leaves no doubt in my mind McNEIL is not telling the truth when he said EBSARY stabbed SEALE.
- In conclusion, the chronology of events surrounding this murder appears thusly to the investigators. SEALE and MARSHALL entered Wentworth Park shortly before midnight intent on "rolling" someone. EBSARY and MCNRIL, somewhat intoxicated, happened to walk through the park and were accosted by SEALE and MARSHALL. Their attacks were not successful and following the altercation a violent argument ensued between the two attackers culminating with MARSHALL stabbing SEALE and then inflicting a superficial wound on his own forearm to divert suspicion from himself before he made the pretense of summoning aid for SEALE. Later MCNEIL, because he had been drinking and because of his subnormal intelligence, formed the idea that EBSARY had in fact stabbed SEALE when they were set upon. This became a fixation in his mind which surfaced in the form of positive action after MARSHALL had been sentenced to life imprisonment.
- 10. Mr. Donald MacNEIL, Q.C. has been made aware of the results of this investigation.

Re: Marshall, Donald, Jr. - 1997 Borchester Fenitentiary

The charge read as follows: that Donald Marshall, Jr. did at Sydney, in the County of Cape Breton, Frovince of Nova Scotia, on or about the 28th day of May, 1971, murder Sanford (Sandy) Seale, contrary to Section 206(2) of the Criminal Code of Canada.

The accused was arrested in whycocomagh on June 4th.,1972 and was remanded to the County Jail until June 7, 1972. There were other adjournments for various reasons and the Ireliminary Hearing was taken on July 28th and Marshall was committed to stand Trial in Supreme Court and was found Guilty on November 5, 1971 and was sentenced to Life Imprisonment by Judge L. Dubinsky.

The evidence offered was that there was a dance at a local hall. Near midnight several young people at the dance left the dance hall. One witness stated that he had not the accused and the deceased and was invited by the accused to go into the Fark with them; but he declined. The witness proceeding along the streets near the park, stopped behind a shrubbery in the park and observed Marshall and Seale walking along Crescent St. and involved in a loud discussion. As he watched, he saw Marshall remove a knife from his right hand pocket and plunge it into the stomach of the deceased. He, the witness, afraid, ran from the scene and to his home.

Another witness testified that he missed his bus and was proceeding along the tracks near the park, he observed the first witness sitting behind the shrubbery, watching the two men in the argument on Crescent St. He knew both the accused and the deceased. He also saw Marshall draw a knife from his pocket and plunge it into the abdomen of Mr. Seale, the deceased. Seale was alive when he was taken to the hospital but he died the following afternoon.

A comment from the Judge to the Jury was that the man who stabbed the late Sanford (Sandy) Seale intended to murder him because of the severe lacerations which were caused by the plunging of the weapon.

This will confirm our telephone conversation of this date with reference to the above murder.

In 1971 I was a member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and stationed on the Polygraph Section at Regina, Saskatchewan. During the month of November that year I received a call from Supt. E. A. Marshall of Halifax, N.S. to assist him with reference to the Marshall murder. Supt. Marshall is now stationed at R.C.M.P. Headquarters at Ottawa, Ontario.

As a result of that request I attended at Sydney, N.S. on 23 November 1971 and my personal ledger shows that I gave polygraph examination to two persons on that date in this regard. It indicates that I examined one J.W. MacNeil and rendered an indefinite opinion as to his truthfulness. It also shows that I examined one R.N. Ebsary and rendered a truthful opinion when he denied committing the murder in question.

I have no other records of my involvement in this matter and I would assume that the R.C.M. Police at Regina would have destroyed the file after a five year period as that was their policy at that time.

My memory of this particular file is quite clear because I use to be stationed in Nova Scotia prior to entering the polygraph program and I remember that the Sydney trip was the first time I returned to Nova Scotia after leaving in July of that same year.

Supt. Marshall advised that One Donald Marshall had been convicted earlier that year of murdering a Negro chap in the park at Sydney, Nova Scotia. The offence had been investigated by your Department and prosecuted by one Donald McNeil. Somtime after the conviction was handed down by the court, one J. W. McNeil came forth and advised that the wrong man had been convicted as he alledged that he saw one R. N. Ebsary commit this murder rather than Marshall. That information had been reported to the Nova Scotia Attorney's General Department and they asked the R.C.M.Police to look into the matter.

It was decided between Supt. Marshall, Supt. Gardiner (O.C. then of Sydney Sub-division of the R.C.M.Police) and myself that we should first examine MacNeil on the story he was giving to the police. I recall that I found him to be a very difficult polygraph subject and I was not able to obtain polygraph charts that I could properly interpret. I therefore had to render an indefinite opinion.

Following that examination, I examined Ebsary on his denial of the murder. I was satisfied that his charts were truthful when he denied involvement and so rendered that opinion.

The results of Ebsary's polygraph examination were given to Mr. Donald MacNeil and it is my understanding that he so advised Donald Marshall's lawyer and give him the opportunity to submit his client to the examination. It is also my understanding that Marshall, through his lawyer, declined the examination.

The foregoing concluded my involvement in this particular matter and I must confess that the subject never crossed my mind again until you called this date.
